Year: 12/13 Subject: MFL - French

Overview

A-level in French provides an engaging and exciting opportunity for students to build on their previous study of French. Through social, intellectual, historical and political cultural themes students will be able to develop their linguistic knowledge and cultural understanding of the countries/communities where the language is spoken. An opportunity to study literature and film will allow students to undertake a deeper analysis of language structures and increase their cultural awareness as part of an integrated approach to language learning. A strong focus is placed on building students' confidence and fluency in spoken French using relevant and topical themes. The requirement to research an area of personal interest related to the country/communities where French is spoken will enhance students' cultural appreciation and enable them to gain a greater awareness of intercultural differences.

The topics studied are:

- Families and citizenship
 - o Youth trends and personal identity
 - Education and employment opportunities
- Understanding the French-speaking world
 - Regional culture and heritage in France, French-speaking countries and communities
 - Media, art, film and music in the French-speaking world

- Diversity and Difference
 - Migration and integration
 - Cultural identity and marginalisation
 - o Cultural enrichment and celebrating difference
 - Discrimination and diversity
- France 1940-1950: The Occupation and post-war years
 - June 1940–May 1945
 - The cultural dimension in occupied France
 - 0 1945-1950
- French literature
 - Delphine de Vigan: No et Moi A novel (2007)
- French cinema
 - Christophe Barratier: Les Choristes A feature film (2004)

A-level French is a challenging but rewarding option. Students should already have a good grounding in the French language before embarking on the course, as they will be expected to develop complex understanding of a range of topical issues through the use of the French. Spontaneous discussion is a normal part of lessons, and students develop debating and essay-writing skills which are transferable to other subjects and situations.

Term 1.1 La famille en voie de changement

Describe and discuss trends in marriage and other forms of partnership Consider and discuss the merits and problems of different family structures Consider relationships between the generations and discuss problems that can arise Form and use the imperfect tense, perfect tense, and recognise the past historic.

Term 1.2 La « cyber-société »

Describe and discuss how technology has transformed everyday life.

Consider and discuss the dangers of digital technology.

Consider the different users of digital technology and discuss possible future developments

Understand and use infinitive constructions, object pronouns and irregular verb constructions.

Term 2.1 Le rôle du bénévolat

Examine the voluntary sector in France and the range of work volunteers provide Discuss the benefits of voluntary work for those that are helped and how beneficiaries request help

Look at the benefits of voluntary work for those that do it and for society as a whole Use connectives –temporal and causal

Use conditional and si sentences (Imperfect and conditional)

Form and use the future tense

Term 2.2 Une culture fière de son patrimoine

Understand the notion of heritage and heritage preservation on a regional and national scale

Consider the ways in which some of the country's most famous heritage sites market themselves

Comprehend how heritage impacts upon and is guided by culture in society Use the subjunctive with expressions of doubt, uncertainty or necessity Analysis of a novel

Term 3.1 La musique francophone contemporaine

Consider the popularity of contemporary francophone music and its diversity of genre and style

Consider who listens to contemporary francophone music, how often and by what means

Consider and discuss the threats to contemporary francophone music and how it might be safeguarded.

Term 3.2 Le septième art

Consider a variety of aspects of French cinema

Consider the major developments in the evolution of French cinema from its beginnings until the present day

Consider the continuing popularity of French cinema and film festivals Analysis of a film
